In 2004 SGMB's portfolio of Technical Cooperation projects was composed of:

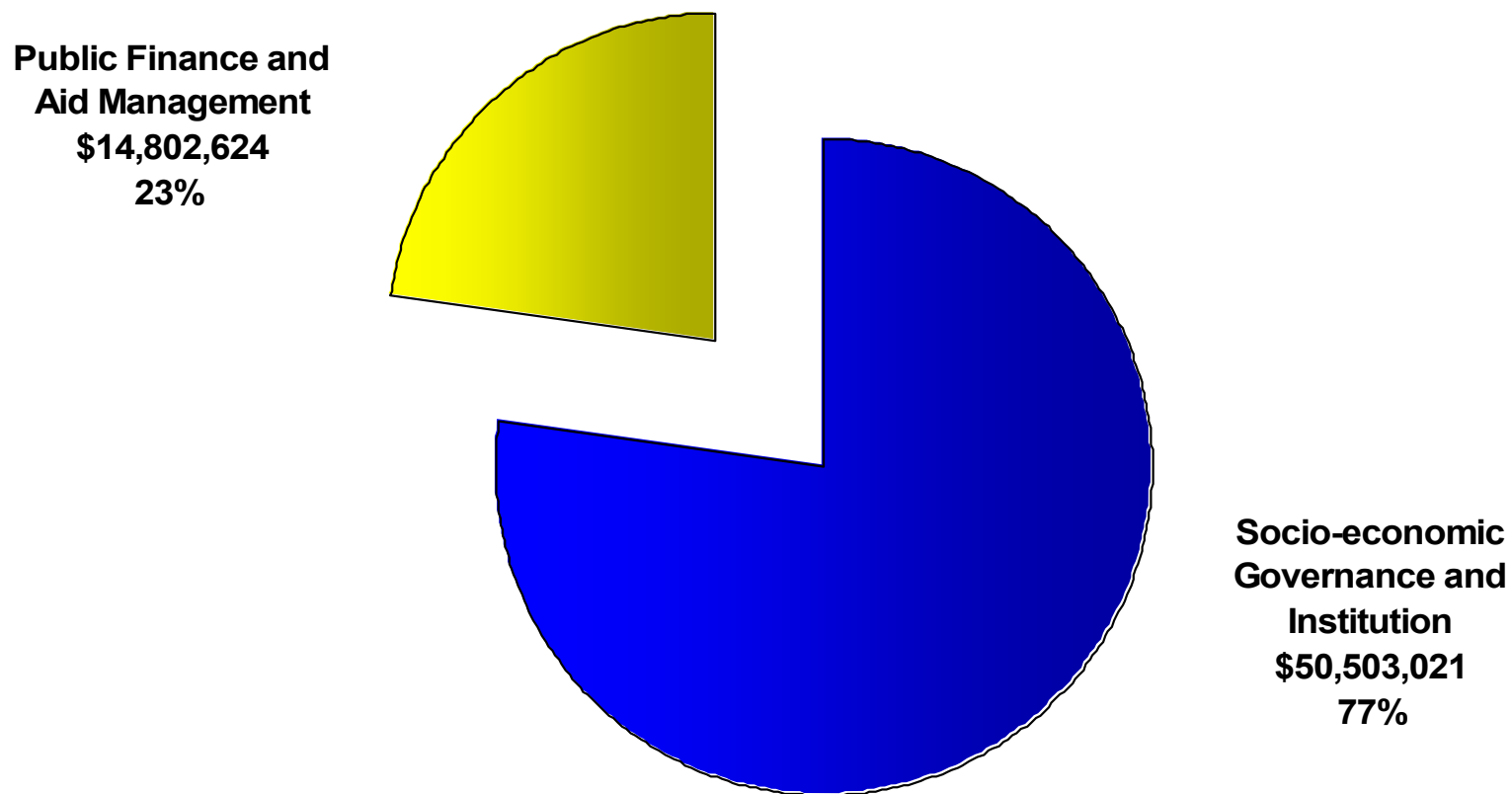
Total Number of Projects: 63 (RB:17+XB:46)

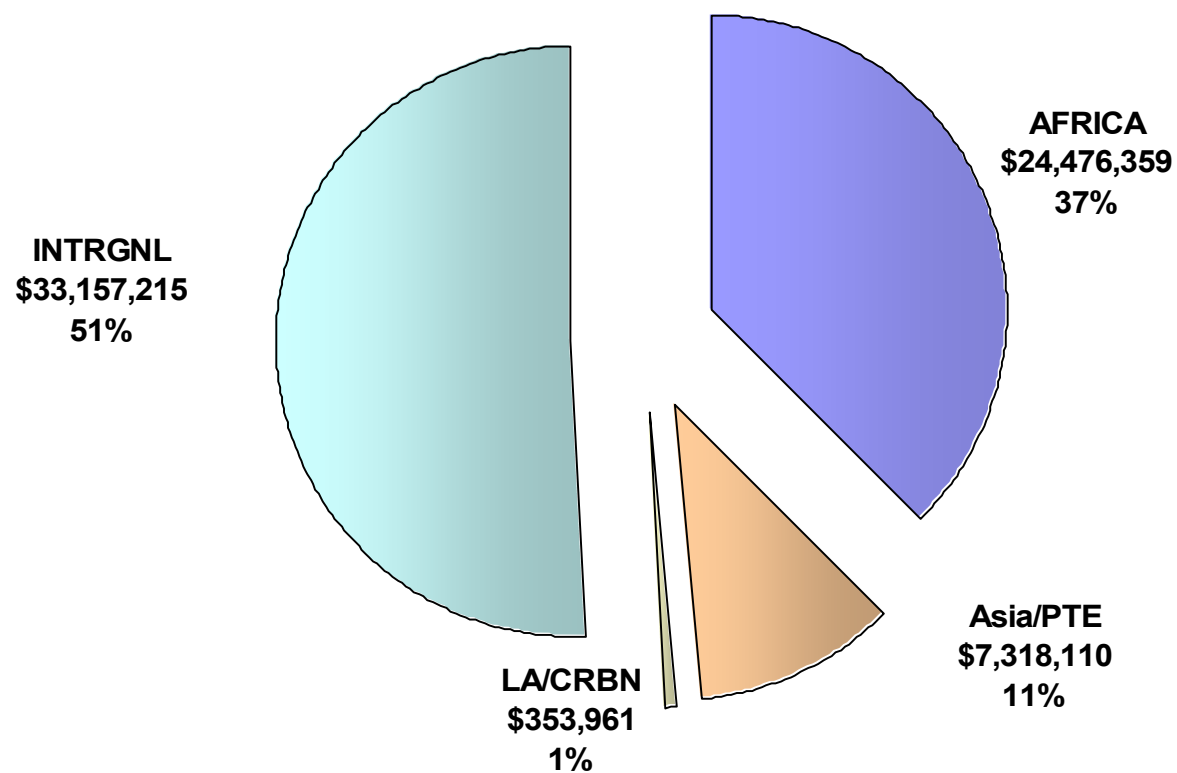

6. Introduction of new ideas, innovations, etc.

Key emphasis of SGMB's work is on pro-poor public administration and citizen-based policy and monitoring processes

- 'Engaged Governance' – citizen/government dialoguing in policy making
- Training in pro-poor budgeting
- Participatory auditing - auditing for social change
- Linking evaluation as a tool for pro-poor public policy
- Results based monitoring and evaluation
- Institutional capacity building for poverty alleviation with environmental sustainability
- Community based disaster preparedness and management – a response to Tsunami by UNCRD

7. Conclusions

- There is a rising global interest in citizen engagement in public policy
- SGMB experience in institutional aspects of public policy, especially those that relate to poverty suggest need for continuous advocacy and capacity building
- SGMB's technical cooperation provides practical insight into its normative and analytical work
- SGMB's technical cooperation work in Sub-Saharan Africa positions it very well to contribute to poverty reduction policies, implementation of MDGs etc. in the region.
- New initiatives in disaster preparedness and mitigation warrant need for more capacity building at the community level.
